You are not required to volunteer for every shift this is the span of hours the role is being performed. Applicants to nominate availability as well as shift time when applying.

About the Position

This is a dynamic role with ever changing priorities on an as needs basis. Tasks will be allocated at the start of each shift. This role supports all our work areas including kennels, cattery, pocket pets, birds, reptiles and farm animals. You will have the chance to learn many aspects of the shelter as well as be trained in multiple areas. Your day will include general animal husbandry, socialisation and ad hoc related tasks.

The husbandry tasks are critical for the wellbeing and happiness of dogs and puppies as well as our cats, kittens and rabbits living at the shelter and includes cleaning and feeding. This role is to assist staff in making sure the living arrangements for all our animals are pleasant, safe and sanitary.

Socialisation is about being with our shelter animals so they have the opportunity to have daily positive interaction with a variety of people. Familiarity with humans and handling increases the likelihood of successful adoption.

Key Duties

- Cleaning kennels, cat enclosures, carriers and cages as well as yards and recreational areas for all or our animals
- Handling and socialisation of dogs, puppies as well as cats, kittens, rabbits and a wide variety of other animals.
- Replenishing water, food, bedding and toys in enclosures, yards and animal recreation areas
- Creating and distributing enrichment
- Laundry tasks inclusive of washing/drying/folding blankets, toy cleaning /sorting.
- Washing of equipment including but not limited to the washing and drying of food bowls, litter trays, enrichment items, implements and toys.

Husbandry– Task Analysis

The role of a cleaner is physically demanding requiring a high degree of lifting, bending, squatting and reaching., including within small spaces. Occupants of these roles are on their feet for the entirety of their shift (generally 2 hours). Occupants must be able to work independently and with minimal supervision.
